




Planning your Post-16 Journey:

A Guide for Young People in Sheffield

Welcome!



Choosing what to do after Year 11 can be exciting, but it can also feel confusing. You don't have to decide alone—there's lots of help to guide you.

Sheffield City Council made this guide to help young people choose the best next step after Year 11. It's for students working from Pre-Entry Level up to Level 2 as they move into Post-16 learning. You might find it helpful to go through this guide with a parent, carer, teacher, or careers adviser.

This guide tells you what local schools and colleges offer for the school year starting in September 2025. If you're in Year 11 now, it will help you plan for next year. The guide organises everything by subject and career area so you can decide based on what you want to do in the future.

Exploring your options can help you feel more motivated, clear, and confident. It's the first step toward your success next year and beyond.

Remember, the government says you need to stay in education or training until you're at least 18 (Years 12 and 13). This helps you build skills and get the qualifications you need for further education, work, and adult life. If you have an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP), you can stay in education until you're 25 if that's best for you. This extra time can help you reach your goals and get ready for adult life.

This guide should be read on a computer or device instead of being printed because it has links you can click. The information was correct when written, but things can change. It's a good idea to check with schools and colleges for the latest updates!

Thinking about your Future

It's okay if you don't know what the future holds – many people feel the same way. Thinking about it can sometimes feel like a lot to handle. Here are some simple steps to help you picture your future:

1. Think About What You Enjoy

Start by thinking about what makes you happy. Do you like working with computers, helping others, or being creative? Your hobbies and interests can help you decide what kind of job or activities you might enjoy.

2. Take Small Steps

Instead of thinking about everything at once, focus on small steps. For example, if you love animals, you could visit an animal shelter or learn about different animal jobs. Small steps make big goals easier.

3. Picture a Day in Your Future

Imagine what your daily life could look like. Where might you live? What job could you have? Who would you spend time with? Thinking about this can help you understand what's important to you.

4. Make a Picture Board

You can make a vision board by cutting out pictures from magazines or drawing images that show your future dreams. Include things like jobs, places to visit, or activities you want to try.

5. Talk to Someone You Trust

Share your thoughts with a parent, carer, teacher, or someone who supports you. They can help you explore your ideas and guide you along the way.

6. Be Open to Change

Your interests may change, and that's okay! You don't need to have everything planned right now. Stay open to new opportunities and experiences.

Remember: You don't have to figure everything out at once. You have time to try things, learn, and grow at your own pace!



Understanding your Strengths

Knowing your strengths can help you feel more confident about your future and is important for planning your post-16 education. Here are some ways to find out what you're good at:

- 1. Think About What You Enjoy:** Start by considering the things you love to do. Do you like drawing, playing sports, or solving puzzles? The activities you enjoy can guide you in choosing subjects or courses that interest you.
- 2. Ask for Feedback:** Talk to people you trust, like family, friends, or teachers. Ask them what they think you do well. They might notice strengths in you that you don't see yourself, which can help you pick the right path for post-16 education.
- 3. Try New Activities:** Experiment with different hobbies and activities. This can help you discover new strengths. For example, you could try cooking, gardening, or learning a musical instrument. Exploring new things helps you understand what you might want to study more.
- 4. Reflect on Your Achievements:** Think about times when you felt proud of yourself. What did you do well? Maybe you helped a friend, finished a tough project, or learned something new. These moments can show you your strengths and help you plan for your future.
- 5. Keep a Strengths Journal:** Write down things you do well each week. This can help you notice your strengths over time.

Identifying your strengths will help you choose subjects or courses that fit you best, making it easier to find the right path for your future. Keep exploring and discovering what you're good at!



Coping with Change

- 3. Do Things You Enjoy:** Spend time on hobbies or activities that make you happy.
- 4. Stay Active:** Regular exercise, like walking or dancing, can boost your mood.
- 5. Practice Deep Breathing:** Taking slow, deep breaths can help you feel calm.

Different Pathways after Year 11

After Year 11, young people with SEND in Sheffield have access to full-time programmes designed to build skills, confidence, and independence for the future. Here are three main pathways:

1. Life Skills and Independence

Life skills programmes focus on building everyday abilities to help you become more independent. Through activities like cooking, travel training, and teamwork, you'll gain practical skills, make friends, and grow in confidence as you prepare for adult life. From these programmes, you could progress to supported living, community activities, or volunteering.

2. Foundation and Work-Preparation Courses

Foundation courses combine basic skills like English and Maths with hands-on projects and activities. These programmes help you prepare for future study or work, allowing you to explore different career areas in a supportive setting. After completing foundation courses, you may move on to vocational training or entry-level employment.

3. Vocational Courses for Job Skills

Vocational courses provide practical training in areas like hospitality, construction, and animal care. These courses offer real-life job skills and experience, giving you a strong start toward finding work or further training in your chosen field. From vocational courses, you could progress into entry-level jobs, apprenticeships, or advanced vocational training.

Each of these pathways provides personalised support and valuable experience, helping you take the next step toward a bright and fulfilling future!



Understanding Different Levels

• Pre-Entry - Level 2

This table shows the different levels of programmes, what you need to start at that level and where you can go next.

Level	What It Means	What You Need to Start	What You Can Do Next
Pre-Entry Level	Very basic learning for developing key life skills.	No qualifications needed.	Move to Entry Level programmes for more skills.
Entry Level	Basic skills for learning and everyday life.	No qualifications needed.	Progress to Foundation Learning or Level 1.
Level 1	Beginner skills to prepare for work or study.	No qualifications needed, suitable for those with little to no GCSEs.	Move to Level 2 or start practical training.
Level 2	Intermediate skills, like GCSE level, preparing you for work or further training.	Grade 3 or above in GCSE English and Maths, or completion of Level 1.	Progress to apprenticeships, specialised training, or Level 3 courses.

Maths and English: What you Need to Know

To succeed in many jobs and higher-level courses, it's very important to reach a good level in English and Maths, ideally at grade 4 in GCSEs or Functional Skills Level 2. This is because the government requires people to meet these levels to access most jobs and courses beyond Level 2. Achieving these grades means you have strong skills in reading, writing, and using numbers, which helps in everyday life and work.

For Maths, this level means you can handle basic maths skills like working with money, measuring things, and solving problems. **In English**, it shows you can understand and share information clearly, whether it's reading, writing, or speaking. These are skills many employers look for when hiring.

However, if you find English and Maths hard, it's okay. Remember that everyone learns at their own pace, and there is support available. Many schools and colleges offer extra help to make sure everyone has the chance to do their best. You can work towards your goals in different ways and at the speed that's right for you. The most important thing is to keep trying your best and ask for support when you need it.



Jobs in Sheffield

Sheffield is a city with a variety of job opportunities for young people. The labour market in Sheffield is strong, with jobs in industries like healthcare, education, retail, and technology.

Healthcare is one of the largest industries in Sheffield, with many hospitals, clinics, and care services needing staff. Jobs are available for those interested in caring for others, such as doctors, nurses, and care workers.

Some of you may focus more on learning skills for specific jobs. This could mean exploring courses that teach practical skills, improve your communication, and help you become more independent.

Here are some tips to help you on this journey:

- 1. Join Annual Reviews:** If you have an Education, Health, and Care Plan, go to these meetings. Prepare with help from family or teachers. This is your chance to share your ideas for the future. If you have a personal assistant, they can attend too!
- 2. Look at Different Pathways:** Check out events, websites, or guides that explain various options for your future.
- 3. Try Taster Days:** Attend taster days at different colleges to try out subjects, meet staff, and see what fits you.
- 4. Talk to Teachers or Family:** Share your interests and strengths with people who can help you choose what's best for you.
- 5. Set Small Goals:** Breaking big goals into smaller steps can help you stay motivated.
- 6. Practice Life Skills:** Use this time to learn skills like cooking, budgeting, or using public transport.
- 7. Take Care of Yourself:** Moving on from school can be stressful. Practice ways to relax, stay active, and talk to someone if you're feeling stressed.

This work is perfect for anyone who loves animals and wants to help make their lives better!

Where could these courses take you?

This work sector includes jobs where people look after pets, farm animals, and even wild animals.

Some examples of early careers in this sector are Animal Care Assistant, Kennel Assistant, Pet Grooming Assistant, Dog Walker, Pet Shop Assistant, Farm Hand, Stable Hand, and Wild Life Assistant.

What other jobs are there in this area?

Other roles which would require further specific training, qualifications or experience include Veterinary nurse, Veterinarian, Animal Trainer, Wildlife Biologist, Marine Biologist, Zookeeper, Animal Behaviourist, Animal Shelter manager, Conservation officer and Equine Specialist.

The sport sector is all about getting involved in sports, fitness, and staying active. There are many different jobs in this area, like helping people exercise, planning fun events, or working with professional athletes. It's a fantastic field for anyone who loves being active, working with others, and helping people reach their fitness or sports goals!

Where could these courses take you?

People in the sport sector might work as coaches, trainers, sports facility staff, or event organisers. They could help teach skills, keep people safe, support health and fitness, or even manage sports teams and events. Some examples of early careers in this sector are Sports Assistant, Fitness Instructor, Lifeguard, Sports Coach Assistant, Outdoor Activity Instructor, Event Assistant, Personal Trainer and Sports Retail Assistant.

What other jobs are there in this area?

Other roles which would require further specific training, qualifications or experience include Sports Coach, Sports Therapist, PE Teacher, Sports Event Manager and Sports Journalist.

The hospitality and catering sector is all about serving food and drinks and making customers feel welcome. This includes jobs in places like hotels, restaurants, cafes, and at events. People who work in hospitality and catering help guests feel comfortable, enjoy tasty food, and have a great time.

Jobs in this field can include cooking, serving meals, greeting guests, or helping to plan fun events. It's a perfect choice for anyone who likes working with others, being part of a team, and creating a friendly atmosphere for customers!

Other roles which would require further specific training, qualifications or experience include Construction Manager, Architect, Civil Engineer, Project Manager, Surveyor, Safety Officer or Building Inspector.



Where could these courses take you?

Health Care Assistant, Support Worker, Mental Health Support Worker, or Education Support Worker.

What other jobs are there in this area?

Other roles which would require further specific training, qualifications or experience include Counsellor, Hypnotherapist, Cognitive Behavioural Therapist, Psychotherapist, Music Therapist, Dance/Movement Therapist, Art Therapist, Occupational Therapist, Substance Abuse Counsellor, Family Therapist, or Clinical/Forensic Psychologist.
