


Sheffield City Council's Employment and Skills Through Planning and Procurement Report

Report Overview and Aims



Social Value is all about the positive impact an organisation has on society beyond its financial bottom line. While profit is tracked in traditional accounting terms, Social Value is measured by the actions an organisation takes to improve the world around it.

We aim to maximise the social and economic value of Local Authority contracts provided by suppliers that we work with. We mandate that the organisations who are bidding for Council contracts pledge additional community investment. For example, by creating apprenticeships, offering training or working with local schools.

During Quarter Three, we managed 40 contracts and supported suppliers at various stages of projects, to deliver on their employment and skills commitments by introducing them to local partners and services. We aim to ensure this partnership working brings true added value for Sheffield residents by providing opportunities that otherwise would not have existed

Q3 (October - December 2025) Highlights - Education



In October, staff from Amey visited High Green Primary School and met the school's passionate Climate Ambassadors to educate them on the problem with litter. They collaboratively joined in with a litter pick, focusing on the immediate area around the school and making a positive difference to their local area.



On 19th October, 11 schools from across South Yorkshire came together for this academic year's Cutler's Company Better Learners Better Workers programme launch. During the day, all 120 Y9 Ambassadors took part in a series of industry themed workshops, including an introduction to construction led by Willmott Dixon. The students explored the exciting range of jobs within the construction industry and then took part in a challenging STEM based problem solving task which required teamwork and clear communication.

In November, Aureos attended Fir Vale School to deliver a construction workshop to this year's Better Learners Better Workers Ambassadors. The Ambassadors gained knowledge about the range of careers within the industry and learnt about the site at Castlegate, including a summary about its historical importance to the city. An engaging STEM based activity encouraged the Ambassadors to consider the importance of teamwork and clear communication. In the summer, Fir Vale's Ambassadors will have the opportunity to visit the Castlegate site.



Thank you to Henry Boot Construction & Galliford Try for supporting Whirlow Farm Hall Trust with their outdoor learning space through Sheffield Chamber of Commerce's Built Environment for Good consortium. The space will enable horticultural and hands-on outdoor activities all year round, providing meaningful, practical learning experiences for young people who benefit most from alternative education environments.

In October, Fortem visited Bents Green School at Gleadless to donate a selection of tools on behalf of C.B.S. (POWER TOOLS) LIMITED. The tools will support the students to develop their confidence and DIY skills which in turn will continue the improvements being made on the school's allotment.



Additional Social Value, Community and Charity Support

Quarter 3's Employment and Skills Champion Award Winner



Sheffield City Council are excited to announce that **Esh** are this Quarter's Employment and Skills Champion Award winner. The Site teams, building new affordable homes at Newstead and Bolehill View, have demonstrated dedication in fulfilling their commitments. Their conscientious effort has seen a range of impactful and meaningful experiences for local residents.

During Quarter 3, an impressive 45 weeks' worth of T-Level student support and site visits for 12 T-Level students have been delivered. Three weeks worth of work experience, focusing on Social Value has also been delivered to 12 Notre Dame Sixth Form students.

In addition, over 30 hours of educational activities have been delivered to students ranging from Primary School age through to Post-16. The new pond area at Charnock Hall Primary, delivered in partnership by Esh with the YOR4Good fund officially opened in October. This provision will support students of all ages with their scientific enquiry and understanding of ecology.



In November, Esh Construction officially opened its new Interactive Learning Zone at Skills Street, located at Gulliver's Valley Theme Park

Social Value Portal Update

SCC utilises the Social Value Portal (SVP) as a resource to provide us with an accurate and quantifiable social, fiscal and economic impact measurement tool for social value activities undertaken throughout the delivery lifespan our procured major services. Our suppliers register with SVP and commit to a suite of social value outcomes to be delivered in line with the city's priorities. These measurements, or TOMs (Themes, Measures, Outcomes), can include local job opportunities, environmental outcomes and community wellbeing, particularly in areas such as construction. Each TOM has a proxy value determined by multiple socio-economic datasets, including HM Treasury Green Book impact metrics (guidance on how to appraise and evaluate policies and programmes, and advanced analytics to ascribe a social value to social initiatives.)

There are currently 36 live projects on the portal. During Quarter Three, our suppliers have delivered **£3,905,910** worth of Social Value into Sheffield's economy
